

THE PREMISE:

Seven weeks after our miraculous escape from Egypt, we (the Israelites, eventually to be called: Jews) stood together at the foot of Mt. Sinai to hear God and receive an incredible gift - the Ten Commandments. *Standing Together at Sinai: Conversation Cards* focuses on our experiences in the wilderness, helping us see ourselves as if we personally left Egypt and as participants in the awesome experience together at Mt. Sinai.

To play, pick a card and share it with the group. Give the players time to think about question. Have a few of the players share their thoughts. A story about the experience at Mt. Sinai is that the Israelites were sound asleep at the moment God was ready.

To make up for this, there is a Jewish custom to stay awake all night on Shavuot learning with others.

Make a list of things you would find interesting to learn all night long.

When Moses reported that God wanted us to follow the commandments, you heard the Israelites around you say, "All that God has spoken, we will do."

What do you do that helps connect you to God, to the Torah, or the Jewish people?

Commandment #5 - Honor your father and mother

What are ways that you can honor your father and mother?

In 1846, the Reform movement created Confirmation, a ceremony when teenagers confirm their commitment to Judaism.

Why you think Confirmation was placed on Shavuot?

It is a custom to eat dairy foods on Shavuot because according to a story, the Israelites needed to make some quick meal preparations. Dairy is faster to cook than meat.

What would you eat for dinner on Shavuot (don't forget dessert!)?

God could have chosen to speak to the Israelites within a few days from their escape from Egypt. But the meeting at Sinai was 7 weeks later.

Why might God have chosen to wait?

Commandment #4

Remember to keep Shabbat

How can we make Shabbat

look different from the other

days of the week?

Make a list of things you can do to make Shabbat special/ different from the rest of the week.

You stood at Mt. Sinai with millions of Jews.

The mountain shook with thunder, lightning, and the shofar blasting. If that wasn't awesome enough, God spoke the Ten Commandments.

If you created a tweet of your experience or feelings.

When we didn't have food in the wilderness, God sent manna. It was harvested every morning, each person according to his/her portion. It is said that manna tasted like whatever the person eating it imagined.

As a newly freed slave, what did you imagine it tasting like?

Your fellow Israelites complained about so much: not having food, not having water, not being in the "comfortable" and familiar land of Egypt.

What was your major complaint in those first 49 days out of Egypt.

When the Israelites arrived at Mt. Sinai, God told Moses that no one was touch the mountain.

As you went to wash your clothes, you overheard someone saying that not touching the mountain was a silly rule.

You went over to talk to her.
What did you say?

God said, "I make this covenant not with you alone, but both with those who are standing with us this day, and with those who are not with us here this

day." (Deuteronomy 29:13-14)

So, the tradition is that we ALL stood at Sinai.

Among the millions of Jews (past and present) there that day, which two were at your side when God spoke?

When you arrived at Mt. Sinai, God told Moses to tell the Israelites to get ready. You had to make yourselves holy, wash your clothes and be ready on the third day.

You had a conversation with your best friend about this.
What did you say?

Standing at the foot of Mt. Sinai, we all heard the Ten Commandments (it was AWESOME!).

What hopes do you have for how the people around you will behave, now that they heard these new laws?

We all stood at the foot of Mt. Sinai with about 2 million other Israelites. The sky was so dark, the thunder was so loud and it looked like a light show with all the lightning.

What were you feeling at that moment?

We all left Egypt with the clothes on our back, some jewelry we borrowed from your Egyptian neighbors, and some unbaked dough.

What questions did you ask Moses as you passed by him on your way out of Egypt? Moses' father-in-law, Jethro, helps Moses better manage the complaints and issues that occur when more than two million people are camping together in the desert.

You are picked to be a judge and leader over a hundred people. What will you tell those 100 people.

In the 15th day of the second month after leaving Egypt, you are still in the desert. You join everyone else in complaining about missing the "good life" that you had in Egypt.

What things about life in Egypt are you missing?
